The power to regulate currency in a modern sovereign State is either with the Government or the Central Bank. A private decentralised crypto currency is neither issued by the State nor regulated by the State. Therefore, more than 8500 crypto currencies globally with a market Capitalisation of more than USD One Trillion do not have legal tender. In India, the crypto currency is not banned. The restriction imposed by the Reserve Bank of India through its circular dated 6th April 2018 was declared to be void on the ground of proportionality by the judgement of the Supreme Court of India. At the same time, there is a draft bill, which is yet to be introduced in the Parliament of India to ban private crypto currencies in India. Thus, there is uncertainty w.r.t. the legal status of crypto currency in India.

DYNAMICS OF GEOPOLITICS IN RUSSIA AND UKRAINE

The conflict between Russia and Ukraine can be looked at through the prisms of geo-culture, geopolitics and geoeconomics. If this continues, it may have a deeper impact on the security of both Europe and Asia through its spill over effect.
